It is considered to be the most important legal work published in the colony, covering the years 1637 through 1763 and supplemented by extensive indices. The work is also noted for its typography, the quality of the printing, and the first appearance of the seal of Maryland on the titlepage. He is described in the Library Company Afro-Americana catalogue (Item 44) as "the colonial anchor-man of the Anglo-American anti-slavery axis." Benezet worked ceaselessly to have slavery abolished by the colonial legislatures, and corresponded with Granville Sharp, one of the most important English abolitionists. When Pennsylvania passed an abolition law in 1780 that granted freedom to children of slaves upon reaching the age of twentyeight (until then they would enjoy the same rights as indentured servants and apprentices), other states did not immediately follow. Benezet told Benjamin Franklin he found it "sorrowfully astonishing that after the declaration so strongly and clearly made of the value & right of liberty on this continent, no state but that of Pennsylvania & that imperfectly, have yet taken a step towards the total abolition of slavery." On his return to Philadelphia in 1785, Franklin became president of the Pennsylvania Society for Promoting the Abolition of Slavery. Among the works the society distributed were those of the London abolitionist Thomas Clarkson. Benezet had influenced Clarkson's anti-slavery views. In The History of the Abolition of the Slave Trade, Clarkson states: "Benezet's account of Guinea became instrumental beyond any other book ever before published, in disseminating a proper knowledge of the slave trade." A combination broadside prospectus and stock certificate for 100 acres of land, part of a 1,849,000-acre property in Virginia and Kentucky owned by the Compagnie de Colonisation Américaine, founded by Jean Sigismond Ehrenreich, Comte de Redern. The company's American agent, John Swan, was an adventurer long active in Franco-American commercial affairs. The text describes the division of land sales between individual colonists and speculators, the different classes of shares, financial organizations, commercial potential, future improvements, etc. This is one of 12,000 shares constituting Series B, numbered 9563 and dated July 1, 1820.

The Comte de Redern (1761-1841) was a Prussian diplomat, intellectual, eccentric, and entrepreneur. During the time he was serving as Prussian Minister at the Court of London in the

early 1790s, Redern developed a friendship with Henri Saint-Simon, with whom he shared utopian visions and a progressive humanist philosophy. The two developed a financial partnership and jointly purchased French national lands during the 1790s, an enterprise imbued with idealism but which dissolved into personal conflict that dragged on for decades. During the early 1800s, Redern invested heavily in both industry and land. In 1820, the time this certificate was issued, "his vast enterprises crashed around him. To escape his creditors, he fled to Brussels, and from there to Holland, where he was imprisoned. He took to practicing hypnotism, underwent a religious conversion...after many years he was allowed to return to France, where he resumed his philosophical studies" (Frank E. Manuel, The New World of Henri Saint-Simon, Cambridge, MA, 1956, p.107). Redern wrote several books, including works on politics, psychology, and the nature of man. In earlier issues of this broadside, Redern is listed as the proprietor of the Company. In this later issue, the proprietor is identified as Louis Philibert Brun D'Aubignosc, a French imperial administrator.

One of the first works in English to extensively describe the Southeast. Coxe, who claimed grants of much of the South, sought to arouse British concern over the area's occupation by the French. Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, and Louisiana are described. The large folding map is often lacking from copies of the book, including the copy at hand. The elder Daniel Coxe was physician to Charles II and Queen Anne; his son inherited his claims to grants in the South and produced this book. With the exception of the title, this third issue is identical to the first published in 1722. According to William S. Coker, in his introduction to the 1976 University of Florida facsimile of the first edition, the three subsequent "editions" were in fact re-issues of the unsold sheets of the first edition with new updated title pages inserted.

This is one of the first English works to describe the Southeast in any detail. Colonel Coxe laid claim to an enormous amount of land in the South thanks to grants made to his father Dr. Daniel Coxe by King Charles II. Coxe published the present work to further his families claims, but also to raise awareness of the huge potential of the area and the dangers posed by French incursions. He did not limit himself to the Carolinas, discussing the lower Mississippi in detail as well. Florida, Georgia and Louisiana are also described. Much of the information, gathered from British hunters

and explorers, is published here for the first time. The work is also credited with being the first published proposal of a political confederation of the North American colonies.

The map, which is often missing, is a particularly fine copy: it is of real importance. Drawn up by the Coxe family to illustrate their claims, it is also the first English depiction of the Mississippi valley. It also improved on all previous maps by eliminating the mountain ranges that were often shown as running beside the Mississippi River, as well as correctly fixing the location of the Appalachian and Ozark Mountains. It extends as far north as the Great Lakes and includes an inset of the Mississippi Delta at the lower right "A Map of the Mouth of the River Meschacebe". Church 886; Clark I:68; cf. His wide-ranging interests and position led him to accumulate materials on practically every aspect of life in South Carolina at the time, including natural history; Indians; minerals; raising rice, tobacco, and corn; inland navigation; commerce and manufactures; and various social and charitable activities. Drayton's work is well illustrated, with a large map of South Carolina, one of the Santee Canal, and plates showing the State House, rice cultivation, and fossils discovered in the un-country.

After the book was completed, Drayton obtained a map of Winyaw Bay, and had a postscript and the map printed and tipped into some copies. This copy contains this rare insert, both the postscript and map, frequently lacking; copies often do not have a complete complement of plates and maps, and even the Streeter copy lacked the map of South Carolina. An unmatchable superb copy in absolutely original condition.

One of thirty copies of this dark and dramatic lithographic print depicting the lynching of Matthew Williams in Salisbury, Maryland in 1931. Williams worked as a laborer for a wealthy factory owner, Daniel J. Elliott, in town and was charged with murdering his boss over a wage dispute, although some uncorroborated accounts claim it was Elliott's son who committed the crime and pinned it on Williams. Williams himself had been shot in the altercation and was taken to the hospital, where a mob of over two thousand broke through the doors and forcefully dragged him to the courthouse where he was hanged. His body was then carried into town, doused in gasoline, and burned. The print depicts Williams hanging from a tree with his hospital bandages still around his head. His body is twisted in pain, and in the background a group of small figures stands next to a bonfire raising guns or other objects above their heads.

The artist of this piece, Edmund Duffy, was a multiple Pulitzer-prize winning cartoonist who often targeted racist groups and hate crimes with his work. A colleague of Duffy's once noted that he had "an immense capacity for hatred, but his hatred [did] not rise to incandescence except when turned on injustice" (Harrison, p. 28). The artist worked for the BALTIMORE SUN and H.L. Mencken between 1925 and 1948 (where his first printed cartoon admonished President Coolidge for his limp response to Klan activities) and is perhaps best known for his editorial cartoons surrounding the Scopes Monkey Trial. The BALTIMORE SUN covered the story of Williams' lynching extensively. Duffy's decision to use the title of Maryland's state song for the title of his depiction of this vicious hate crime as a further indictment of his fellow Marylanders, along with angry comments from Mencken, led to riots and public protests - not against the crime, but against the paper. This copy of MARYLAND, MY MARYLAND is inscribed by Duffy to the novelist Joseph Hergesheimer and dated 1932. Hergesheimer was also a friend of Mencken's whose ornate and elaborate prose garnered both great praise and scorn in the 1920s and 30s.

No copies of this print are listed in OCLC, though we are able to find copies at the National Museum of African American History and Culture and the H.L. Mencken Collection at the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore. A bold and striking indictment of the mob violence that was taking place in America well into the 20th century, printed in only a handful of copies. Rare and important. S.L. Andrew Ellicott came from a talented Quaker family with mills in Pennsylvania and Maryland. "No Quaker himself, he served in the Revolution. He was best known as a surveyor, having had a hand in the boundaries of New York, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Georgia, and South Carolina; and he surveyed the District of Columbia. Pursuant to the treaty of San Lorenzo el Real, 1795, he was appointed by George Washington as United States commissioner for drawing the boundary between the United States and the Spanish Floridas.

"Ellicott's Journal is the product of this commission. The narrative part of it is no journal at all, but a carefully composed work written in 1802.... The appendix is a record of meteorological, astronomical, and chronometrical observations from the mouth of the Ohio (late 1796) down the Mississippi, and along the boundary and Gulf Coast to the mouth of St. Mary's (early 1800). He was quite critical of slavery: "The poor slaves I saw here did not appear to me to stand any higher in the scale of animal existence than the horse: the horse does his daily task, eats his changeless provender, and at night is driven to his stable to be shut in, until he is again drawn forth at the earliest dawn to go through the same unpitied routine until he dies. This is the history of the slave in Texas, differing in nothing from that of the horse, except that instead of maize and straw he is supplied with a little salt pork to his maize, day after day, without any change, until death relieves him from his weariness" (Vol. 2, p. 189).

"Featherstonhaugh left Baltimore on August 1, 1834, and traveled by rail to Frederick and thence by stage through Harper's Ferry, Winchester and Staunton, to the Virginia Springs...He proceeded westward with his son, through Fincastle, Wytheville, Abingdon, and Saltville, to Blountville Tennessee. On this trip he overtook a slave trader, now known to have been John Armfield, with three hundred slaves bound for Natchez, a circumstance which led to his inclusion of a vigorously critical reaction to slavery and the slave trade. Continuing in Tennessee, he passed through Kingsport, Rogersville, Knoxville. to Nashville. He was well pleased with Nashville where he remained for some days... He proceeded by way of Bowling Green, Mammoth Cave, and Elizabethtown to Louisville. Next he proceeded to St. Louis and Little Rock; then went a short way into Texas and back to Little Rock where he embarked by steamboat to New Orleans. This book is a cornerstone of frontier literature and is illustrated with a large folding map of Kentucky. The map, measuring 15 1/2 by 14", was executed specifically for the French edition and differs significantly from the maps in the American edition and in the later English edition. Further, the map in the American edition was not usually issued with the book; this, then, is the first edition of this work with a generally available map.

The book's importance "lies in its being the first history of Kentucky. It contains the first map of Kentucky and probably the first account of Daniel Boone. The author first described Kentucky, and then incorporated the Boone narrative, which was certainly not written by Boone. 'The Minutes of the Pianashaw Council, held at Post St. Vincent, April 15, 1784' was followed by brief descriptions of Indian tribes, and tables giving the distances from Philadelphia to the Falls of the Ohio by way of Boone's Trace and from Philadelphia to New Orleans by way of the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers.

It begins with the daily happenings on the voyage from England....It then discusses the various Indian tribes, the location of their lands, Oglethorpe's dealings with them, incidents in the life of Tomo-chi-chi, the system of land grants, descriptions of Savannah and Frederica, and an account of the air, soil, rivers, roads, and other matters" - Clark.
